



SERMON NOTES by Rev. Dave Steane



Today, we continue our summer sermon series on the powerful New Testament letter from the Apostle Paul to the Galatians. The series is called *Unburdened* because Galatians spotlights the power of God's grace in and through Jesus Christ to unburden us from the of trying to earn our salvation through human effort. Galatians is a letter about the joy and implications of being set free by the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and what an important message that is for us today.

Throughout the epistle, Paul has confronted the Galatian Christians regarding being misled by false teachers who asserted that it was necessary to conform to the Old Testament laws in addition to having faith in Jesus Christ. Galatians 5:1 sums up Paul's argument: *"For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery."*

Freedom is a powerful and beautiful thing, but freedom also calls us to make choices about how we will choose to live. In Galatians 5:16-25, Paul offers a contrast between two very different ways to live. One way is the desire or works of the flesh, and the other way is the fruit of the Spirit.

- 1. In Galatians 5:16, Paul begins this section by instructing the Galatians to *"walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh."* The Greek word for *"walk"* is best understood as *"conducting one's life in a certain manner."* Paul is drawing on a Hebrew idiom his audience would have understood regarding their conduct as is relates to obeying the Old Testament Law. To what extent do you pay attention to your *"walk"*?
- 2. Several times Paul references "the flesh" in this passage. The Greek word for "flesh" is much broader than skin or improper sexual desire. Rather, it describes a comprehensive reality of the totality of fallen humanity. It is *everything* that is in opposition to God. For Paul, the flesh is in opposition to the Spirit and there's conflict and tension with this reality. Reflect on the ways you've experienced this conflict and tension.
- 3. Lists of vices and virtues were common in the ancient world. These can be found in the writings of many ancient thinkers. Paul uses that same approach to illustrate the differences between the desires of the flesh and the fruit of the Spirit. These flesh vices listed in verses 19-21 include: *"sexual immorality, impurity, sensuality, idolatry, sorcery, enmity, strife, jealousy, fits of anger, rivalries, dissensions, divisions, envy, drunkenness, orgies and things like these.*" Reflect on the ways that each vice is in opposition to God's design for humanity.
- 4. Paul then offer a list of virtues as the fruit of the Spirit: *"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law."* Compare this passage with Jesus' words in Luke 6:43-45 and in Matthew 12:33. Reflect on the different fruit listed in Galatians 5:22-23. Which ones do you recognize in your own life? Which ones may be lacking somewhat?
- 5. Some people have interpreted this passage as a choice between two lists; a choice between two sets of behaviors aimed at earning God's favor. To think this way is to continue the false teaching that we need good works in addition to having faith in Christ. Rather, Paul seems to say that when we receive God's grace through Jesus Christ, the Spirit takes up residence in us and that Spirit will cause us to bear God-honoring fruit in response to God's mercy and goodness. In what ways have you experienced this type of freedom?
