



We've given it that title because we are truly "unburdened" from sin, guilt, hopelessness, and all that goes with them through the only true gospel there is! The good news of Jesus Christ, crucified and risen, and His grace alone!

As Paul wraps up his communication to the Galatian Christians, he reminds them of the practical and ethical implications of being a Christ follower in community with other Christ followers. But he cannot leave it there. Why? Because he knows they are likely to believe that if they just obey the moral code, they will be in good shape with God. Thus he comes back one more time to his core point, summed up in Galatians 6:15 (NLT): "It doesn't matter whether we have been circumcised or not. What counts is whether we have been transformed into a new creation."

As you talk about the passage and the sermon, consider the following helps for study and discussion:

- It is self-evident that followers of Jesus should not be conceited or provoke each other to anger and envy. So why do you think Paul feels compelled to emphasize this? Why do we need to hear this again and again?
- 2. We are told to "share each other's burdens" in Galatians 6:2. What does this mean, especially as you look at Galatians 6:1-3 as a whole?
- 3. On one hand, we are involved in the lives of one another, helping those who struggle and receiving help when we fall. On the other hand, "we are each responsible for our own conduct" (Galatians 6:5, NLT). How do these two truths work together in daily life?
- 4. If you read Galatians 5:26–6:10 by itself, it sounds like Christianity is mostly about doing the right thing. How is the gospel both more and less than that?
- 5. Paul takes great pains to show that this communication is from him in Galatians 6:11. Why is this so important to him? To us?
- 6. With at least three examples, show how Galatians 6:15 sums up Paul's entire argument in Galatians.
- 7. Respond to C. S. Lewis' statement about transformation: "The terrible thing, the almost impossible thing, is to hand over your whole self—all your wishes and precautions—to Christ. But it is far easier than what we are all trying to do instead. For what we are trying to do is to remain what we call 'ourselves', to keep personal happiness as our great aim in life, and yet at the same time be 'good'. We are all trying to let our mind and heart go their own way—centered on money or pleasure or ambition—and hoping, in spite of this, to behave honestly and chastely and humbly. And that is exactly what Christ warned us you could not do. As He said, a thistle cannot produce figs. If I am a field that contains nothing but grass-seed, I cannot produce wheat. Cutting the grass may keep it short: but I shall still produce grass and no wheat. If I want to produce wheat, the change must go deeper than the surface. I must be ploughed up and re-sown."
