Isaiah 40:1-11 & Mark 1:1-8 • Why This Way?

This is the second in our Advent/Christmas Series on questions surrounding Christmas, and how we can prepare for the Savior's arrival. What is a little surprising in how Isaiah chapter 40 and Mark 1 challenge us to get ready? Why is this method best or needed?

- 1. The People of Israel had been taken in captivity to Babylon in 587 BC because of their sins. The prophet says their liberation is near, in sight, close at hand; that God would use Cyrus, the Persian King, to overthrow Babylon and send the people of God home. So, God comforts the people and gives them hope regarding deliverance. Read Is. 40:1-11. What is the Good News delivered in verses 1-2?
- 2. In verses 3-5, a *court herald* challenges what they need to do for God to arrive and save them. What is prescribed? Is this literal or symbolic? How might a person or group of people clear a path in their lives and hearts for God? What might that look like for you this Advent?
- 3. In verses 6-8, it appears the people, or at least one person (the prophet representing the people), asks questions or has excuses. What impediment is shared? What does the writer say is needed in verse 8? Note: The writer seems to suggest it is not up to us, but up to God to speak and show up. In other words, the imprisoned can't free themselves. Does that ring true for you?
- 4. In verses 9-11, a herald is told to get up to a high place and say specific words. What are those words? Are they Good News to those enslaved or bad? And how is the Lord God to come? How is verse 10 different than verse 11? Namely, is it all *might and power* or *tenderness and care*? Or both? Which do you think you need most this Christmas? What if you prayed verses 10 and 11 fervently this week and asked God to come to you and those you love in those two specific ways?
- 5. Just like God made a way for the people of God to get back home around 500 BC, Mark 1:1-8 says God is going to do the same thing through His Son, Jesus the Christ, and with the aid of John the Baptist. John is the herald; he helps the people prepare the way for the Lord, using the prophecy in Is. 40 as his template. Read Mark 1:1-8. How is the way to be cleared for the Savior (look esp. in verses 5-6)?
- 6. Why do you think confessing our sins or repenting is the method that effectively prepares the way for the Lord?
- 7. Tim Keller has said that true repentance begins when we end (a) whitewashing ("nothing really happened"), (b) blame shifting ("it wasn't really my fault"), (c) self-pity ("I'm sorry because of what it has cost me"), and (d) self-flagellation ("I will feel so terrible no one will be able to criticize me"). What needs to end in you and me so that true repentance really can occur? What needs to happen in you and me so the Savior truly can come to free us this Christmas?
