
CHECK IN with one another as you gather with a little more intentionality. How is it really going with you now? [15 minutes]

SHARE your "praises" (reasons for thanksgiving to God) and "petitions" (reasons for intercession to God). Please be as open as you are comfortable in being. Then **PRAY** for the praises and petitions by some combination of: 1) silent prayer, 2) several people voicing brief prayers, and 3) one person praying on behalf of the group. Include a prayer for God's Spirit to help with the study and discussion. [15 minutes]

READ ALOUD in your group the passage for this meeting, Revelation 3:14-22, with at least one volunteer, then **DISCUSS** with the group your responses to the questions below: [40 minutes]

- 1. Note how the risen Jesus is characterized at the beginning of the message to the church at Laodicea. What strikes you as particularly noteworthy or helpful for seeing the character and nature of the risen Jesus?
- 2. A commendation is missing in this message as well. Instead the risen Jesus critiques the church in Laodicea strongly in verses 15-16. What is the core of His criticism of this church that, to an outside observer, would seem to have it all together? What strong visual image does He employ? (Note to the reader: first-century readers would know that both hot and cold waters were of great value, but lukewarm waters were of little worth.)
- 3. What misreading of their true spiritual condition do the Christians in Laodicea experience, according to verse 17? How do they see themselves? How does the risen Jesus see them?
- 4. Seeing ourselves as God truly sees us is often difficult but quite necessary. Read Genesis 1:26-31; Genesis 3:1-7; Romans 3:9-12; and Ephesians 2:1-10. Then describe briefly how the Bible communicates the human condition, and why such a biblical perspective is vital for a relationship with God through Jesus Christ.
- 5. What three symbolic acts does the risen Jesus direct the Christians of Laodicea to do in verse 18? How do you interpret these acts? How may these acts be beneficial for our spiritual health today?
- 6. How are verses 19-20 comforting and encouraging to the Christians in Laodicea? How are they comforting and encouraging to us? What strong image (the second one in this passage) is used to convey the risen Jesus' willingness to be present with us? What is remarkable about this image to you?
- 7. What is the Spirit saying to you not only in this particular study on the message to the church in Laodicea, but through these seven messages to the churches of Revelation as a whole? How have they spoken to you as Lent comes to its conclusion?

PRAY as you end your time together. As you are able, share with the group at least one way this group has been beneficial to you.
