# **SERMON**NOTES

## Lost In Translation: Words that Matter to Mom

Notes by Rev. Dr. Alf Halvorson

This is the 1st in a short three-part sermon series on some of the most important Hebrew Words that Christians should know. We will explain (explore?) the words and how they apply to our faith.

I saw recently on twitter a post that said there were over one hundred different words for 'camel' in Arabic, depending on physical appearance and behavior: size, age, colors, hair, tails, length of neck, etc. Al-jafool is a camel that is frightened by anything. Al-harib is a female camel that walks ahead of the other camels. If you just say the basic English word *camel*, something crucial is 'lost in translation.' It is the same, I am told, with all the names for snow by the Inuit's in Alaska. Each particular name points to something unique and important.

Maybe you've never considered that English isn't God's first language. The Bible's native tongue is Hebrew, Greek, and Aramaic. Three quarters of the entire Bible was originally written in Hebrew. No translation is perfect. Many Bible translators even talk about the violence of translation. In the 4th C, Saint Jerome translated the Bible into Latin, the most common language of his day. He said that translators acted like *invaders* who went inside foreign lands, stole thoughts, and brought them back home. More than a thousand years later, Martin Luther translated the Bible into German. Under heavy criticism from his detractors, Luther said he had to choose whether to "demolish" the German language or "depart from" the biblical word. In passages of great importance, he insisted he deformed German rather than harm the Bible.

Take a passage from the Old or New Testament and look at five or six English Translations or Paraphrases. They will let you know, as you read, where the hard words to translate are located by the different renderings of particular words or phrases or entire ideas. There is often something *lost in translation*. That is why Presbyterian Pastors are required to take classes in Hebrew and Greek; and the best biblical commentaries work with the languages, the culture, the history, the literary styles of the various books or letters to increase the accuracy in conveying the message faithfully and help us apply the Word rightly.

- 1. When you try to communicate to people of different ages or parts of the country or who speak a different native language then you, where do you run into the most problems? What has gotten you into trouble? Or, where have you laughed because of the missed meanings? Share stories and examples....
- 2. Have you ever studied or tried to learn another language? Which one or ones? What was easiest about that adventure? What was hardest? What kinds of things can you learn from books or classes or programs? And what kinds of things can only be learned by living in or being immersed in the place or places where the language is spoken and lived?
- 3. It's Mother's Day. It's a chance to think about the difference our moms have made in our lives. Where have you missed each other because of age, stage, roles, priorities, etc? How might you cross the language or other barriers to communicate effectively? Even if your mother has died, what might you say to her in the way of gratitude and thankfulness today? Is there anything to confess to God so that hurts can be named & healing begun?
- 4. Ponder the role of the Holy Spirit (and Christ's love) in helping God communicate with us and us to communicate with God. Read Rom. 8:18-27, 35-39. Seek help from God to overcome the language barriers in prayer by your love and the help of the Holy Spirit.


