A Living Stone: 1 Peter 2:4-10

Peter continues his letter to the Gentile, Christian "exiles" of what is modern-day, northern Turkey. In the last two sermons

we have heard how Peter has written about the eternal hope being held for the exiles in eternity (1:1-12) and encouraging them to live holy, God-like lives even in the midst of their un-God-like, Roman context. This week, Peter writes about the identities they have received as they follow Jesus and the purposes for which those identities have been given. Living for these purposes born out of their God-given identities enables the exiles to experience the benefits of following Jesus even when the world around them is chaos.

- 1. Whether you're using these notes in a group or on your own, take a few minutes to slowly reread 1 Peter 2:4-10. Do this without a pen or pencil in your hand and without any purpose other than allowing yourself to "sit" with God's word. Absorb it. Soak it in. Enjoy it.
- 2. What would you say are the top 5 identities in your life that shape who you are? In the sermon, I mentioned my identities of dad, husband, Chrisitan, pastor, employee, and others. What are some of your identities?
- 3. Where did these identities come from in your life? How did they come to you or how did you begin to identify yourself in such a way?
- 4. What were the identities that Peter affirmed in the exiles? We listed several together that were bunched up in the beginning and ending sections of the passage.
- 5. What were the purposes connected with these identities?
- 6. Try for a moment to imagine yourself in the shoes of the exiles reading Peter's letter. Remember that followers of Jesus are a very small minority in their region. They are just second-generation Christians trying to figure out how to faithfully follow Jesus in an incredibly chaotic world. The world around them is confused by them (at best) and violently opposed to them (at worst). They know the identities Peter is lifting up are true, but the world around them is assigning them a number of different identities. How might they be feeling? What might have been topics of conversation at their gatherings? What might their relationships have been like?
- 7. Have there been times you could relate to the experience of the exiles?
- 8. I explained that the Western world encourages us to find our identities from within ourselves. I argued this is both unkind/unjust and practically impossible. How do you agree or disagree?
- 9. Why would it be encouraging for the exiles that their identities are found externally in the person of and the pursuit of Jesus? Have you ever personally experienced this sort of encouragement?
- 10. I mentioned several practices/spiritual disciplines that could help you live into your purpose-filled identities as followers of Jesus. What practices do you already do? And what might be one new practice you give a try this week?
