## Baptisms at MDPC

any will remember the years of MDPC's Mo-Ranch retreat weekend when we would celebrate immersion baptism in the Guadalupe River that runs by the camp. On Palm Sunday 2022, MDPC celebrated immersion baptisms for the first time during our Sunday morning services!

As Presbyterians, the amount of water used is not what matters, but the power of God behind the water. We sprinkle more often than we immerse, but the theology is the same. Our God is One who comes after us, calling us to Jesus. Baptism is the celebration of being called and welcomed into the family of God, much like circumcision was in the Old Testament. But whereas circumcision was limited to male Israelites, baptism is for all who trust Jesus and their families.

Celebrating baptisms through both sprinkling and immersion allows us to lift up multiple metaphors that the biblical authors use to explain baptism. In sprinkling, we emphasize being washed clean of our sin. Immersion baptism emphasizes being buried with Christ and raised with him to new life.

We are excited to continue MDPC's long history celebrating baptism in both ways.

### A Call to Calm: Tyranny of the Urgent John 15:1-5; Eph 5:15-16 NRSV

This is a stand-alone message after our long eleven-week series on Ezra/Nehemiah. We will in short order be careening toward Thanksgiving and Christmas—if we are not careful. I wanted us to pause and ponder how we might approach the rest of the year in a more intentional and a less out of control (and stressful) way.

- 1. What are your individual and/or family practices from now through the end of the year? Are you usually in balance with your life and work and faith or do you feel out of control during this timeframe?
- 2. Read John 17:1-5. As Jesus approaches His betrayal and death on a cross, how does He pray to the Father? What strikes you as impressive in this prayer? Does anything strike you as odd in the prayer? Why?
- 3. In John 17:4, Jesus says, "I glorified You on earth by finishing the work that You gave Me to do." How could Jesus say that when there were many who had not heard Him teach, or had not been healed by Him? Heck, Jesus never wrote His memoir. What is Jesus getting at here? And how might we finish the work God has for us to do this fall, without burning out?
- 4. Paul in Ephesians 5:15-16 challenges the followers of Jesus in the great city of Ephesus to "Be careful then how you live, not as unwise people but as wise, making the most of the time (or in Greek, *redeeming the time*), because the days are evil." What do you think Paul means here? Did any of my examples in my message give you ideas for your own life the rest of this year? What would be Kairos Time for you instead of just Chronos Time, as I talked about in my sermon?
- 5. How can we really be calm amid the chaos, and not be sidetracked by *the urgent* as we seek to focus on *the important* regarding our relationship with God and with those God has placed in our lives this Thanksgiving and Christmas?
