Matthew 11:2-11

his is the third in our Advent series, *The Unexpected*. Last week we looked at John the Baptist, an odd and unlikely messenger of the Savior. Now John is in prison; he is pressed

by persecution and the prospect of death into doubt and uncertainty; and he asks Jesus An

Unexpected Question.

- 1. In verse 2 of chapter 11 of Matthew, we find out that John is in prison. Read Matthew 14:3-12 to find out why he is incarcerated.
- 2. In verse 3 of chapter 11, John, through his disciples, asks Jesus a question. What is the question? Why do you think he asked it of Jesus?
- 3. Read Ezekiel 5:4 and Jeremiah 12:17. Based on those two verses, what did John expect the Messiah to do?
- 4. Jesus has John think about some other Old Testament verses: Isaiah 26:19, 29:18, 35:5-6, and 61:1-4. Read those texts plus Luke 4:18-19. Why did Jesus pick those verses over Ezekiel and Jeremiah? What do you think He was trying to explain to John, John's disciples, and us?
- 5. Read Matthew 11:4-6. Jesus says, "Go tell John what you hear and see." After the word "hear," you could insert Matthew chapters 5-7. After the word "see," you could insert Matthew chapters 8-10. So, as disciples, we have both Jesus' teaching to go by, as well as His actions/miracles. Why are both important? What conclusion does Jesus hope we will come to from hearing and seeing?
- 6. In verses 7-11 of chapter 11 of Matthew, Jesus lauds John the Baptist. What does Jesus say about John? And yet, in verse 11, He suggests that anyone born of the spirit is greater than John. How do you make sense of that part? What is Jesus getting at here?
- 7. I think John the Baptist was the greatest figure, according to Jesus, of the previous age. But Jesus ushers in a new age. It is like saying when automobiles were becoming popular at the beginning of the 20th century, "You are the greatest manufacturer of the horse and buggy era. But the junior mechanic in Henry Ford's auto plant is greater than you are." Have you ever thought that Jesus ushered in a new era that we still are living in today? He ushered in the Kingdom of God, which still is contested by many, but is expanding nonetheless. What does it mean for us to be citizens and ambassadors of that new Kingdom?
- 8. How might that reality change our focus, our allegiance, and our actions this Advent and Christmas?
