


Pick-Up Choir Sundays in June

How to Make a Legacy Gift

You can enhance the ministries and missions of MDPC by making financial resources available for special projects and initiatives over and above the annual budget and to insure the future of MDPC. Listed below are a few ways that those gifts may be facilitated:

APPRECIATED SECURITIES:

The gift of appreciated securities is most often in the form of common stock or mutual funds. Such a gift is a valuable way to benefit MDPC and for you to receive tax benefits based on the fair market value of the assets.

REAL ESTATE:

Real estate may be deeded outright to Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church or left by bequest. The irrevocable gift of property may provide an immediate tax deduction and avoid capital gains. Due to complexities, be prepared to work with the church and your qualified advisors to ensure that this is a suitable gift for both you and for the church.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITY:

The gift annuity is an irrevocable gift of cash or securities where you receive a predictable fixed income for life. At termination, MDPC receives the residual value of the annuity. There are also potential tax benefits depending upon your particular situation.

RETIREMENT PLAN ASSETS:

In some cases, retirement assets can be the heaviest taxed assets in an estate. Naming MDPC as beneficiary can avoid that taxation, enabling the asset to pass tax-free to the church.

CHARITABLE REMAINDER TRUST:

The remainder trust is an irrevocable gift of assets into a charitable trust

that provides you a fixed (Annuity Trust) or variable (Unitrust) income for life or for a set term. At the trust's termination, the trust assets become a generous gift to MDPC.

LIFE INSURANCE:

Make a gift of a policy or buy a policy making MDPC the beneficiary or partial beneficiary.

CHARITABLE LEAD TRUST:

The lead trust's income payments are distributed to the church for a set period of years, after which the assets are transferred back to the grantor or whomever the grantor has named the beneficiary. This provides generous annual support for MDPC now, removes the asset from the estate, and passes the asset to heirs with little or no tax. There is no immediate deduction for the lead trust.

BEQUEST:

The bequest is a gift through your will or revocable trust that enables you to retain the asset during your life and provide significant support when you no longer require the asset. You may choose a specific item, a percentage, or a residual bequest.

BANK/INVESTMENT ACCOUNT:

Financial accounts can be a simple and inexpensive way to leave a legacy gift for MDPC. Contact your financial advisor to see how easy the process is to make MDPC the beneficiary of a particular investment or cash from a bank account.

...with the Woman at the Well John 4:1-26 • Alf Halvorson preaching This is the second in a series of messages from the Gospel of John on the conversations Jesus had with a variety of people. Today we focus on His conversation with the Samaritan Woman at the well. This is Jesus' longest recorded conversation with anyone in the Gospels. On many fronts, it seems extraordinary that it took place at all: by custom, men and women did not talk in public this way; He was a Jew and she was a Samaritan;

One offered living water and one was stuck in the ceaseless round of drawing water daily at the well. And if you compare it to the conversation Jesus had with Nicodemus last week, Nicodemus came at night, the woman came at noon; he was an Israelite, she was a Samaritan; he was a teacher, and she a housewife; he was a male, she a female; he a "stuck" learner, and she a jaded hurting outcast. It appears that Jesus will meet with anyone, including us, which is great news.

- 1. Read John 4:1-15, especially paying attention to the questions that are asked and the answers given. What is actually said back and forth? Does it seem civil or tense? Light-hearted or are they engaged in verbal jousting? How would you describe the progression: from shallow to deep, or from distant to intimate, or from civil to spiritual, or from what to what?
- 2. What do you think Jesus means by "living water"?
- 3. Read John 4:16-26. There is definitely a change of subject or focus here. What is the change, in your mind? Jesus makes her face herself, and she calls Him a prophet. But how does Jesus ultimately reveal Himself to her in verses 24-26?
- 4. What is the significance of Jesus saying to her, "I am He?" Look up Exodus 3:14, Psalm 46:10, Isaiah 41:10, and John 6:35, 8:12, 10:7, 10:11, 11:25, 14:6, 15:1.
- 5. Read John 4:27-42. I was not able to preach much on this section of the story. How do the disciples react? What does Jesus say to them? What does the woman do as a result of her conversation with Jesus? What results from her actions? How does she become a witness that we might imitate?
- 6. Verse 42 suggests that the townspeople didn't rely on the woman in the end for their faith but investigated it for themselves and heard/saw for themselves. Where might you need to quit relying on others for your faith and take matters into your own hands? What would that look like this week? What did the townspeople do that you might replicate?
