Jump Into Bible Study Discussion (BSD)





DIGGING DEEPER



This is the fifth in a series of sermons on learning discipleship by seeing how Jesus called, challenged, and inspired *The First Disciples*. Today we look at two more apprentices of Jesus: James the Son of Alpheus, and Judas—not Iscariot. James is the apostle that we know the least about from the Bible. The New Testament says nothing but his name. In Mark's Gospel (15:40), he is called James the Less (*micros*, meaning "the short one," "the little one"). That is one of the worst nicknames possible. The other Gospels call him James, Son of Alpheus. Track with me for a moment: Matthew in Mark's Gospel is called Levi, Son of Alpheus. There-

fore Matthew the Tax Collector and James most likely are brothers. Matthew, who we looked at last week, was in league with Rome; James most likely is a Zealot, from the way he is placed by the other zealots in the lists of the original twelve. So they are brothers who have come to the opposite conclusion regarding how to respond to Rome. They have drifted apart and may even hate each other. But they are brought back together by Christ. Jesus came not only to reconcile us to God, but to each other.

Enough about James; now to Judas.

- 1. Judas is called Thaddeus in Mark's Gospel. In Matthew, he is referred to as Lebbaeus, which means *breast-child* or *heart-child*. I would paraphrase "mama's boy." There are no stories about this Judas in Matthew, Mark, or Luke. There is one in John. Read John 14:15-27.
- 2. Jesus is preparing the disciples for His death and the mission of the Great Commission after He returns to the Father. In John 14, Jesus introduces the idea of the Holy Spirit, and that His followers will not be alone. In verses 15-17, what is Jesus' definition of love of Him? And what are the attributes of the Spirit, as described by Jesus in these verses?
- 3. Verses 18-21 continue the dialogue. What is repeated? (Note: Jesus has no "throwaway" lines. He repeats to emphasize, so we don't miss the most important concepts.) Is anything new added?
- 4. In verse 21, Judas (not Iscariot) asks a profound question in the middle of Jesus' teaching. Is his question clear? How would you paraphrase it? What do you think he is really asking Jesus to answer?
- 5. In verses 23-26, Jesus answers Judas' question. As I asked in question 3, what is repeated? Is there anything new?
- 6. It is as if Judas is worried about how the world will get transformed if Jesus is not around. Jesus seems to be saying, "I am going to take over the world one heart at a time. Do I have yours? Keep my words individually, and we'll get to the world together, with the help of the Spirit that the Father will send." Where do you need to stop worrying about the *macro level* and follow Jesus in the *micro areas* of life? And let me go from preaching to meddling. If verses 15 and 21 and 24 define love as keeping God's commandments/words of Jesus, where can you show God love today and this week?
