Lessons from the Master
Judas and Thomas

Matt. 26:14-16, 20-25; 27:1-7 & Jn. 20:24-29

This is the last in a series of messages we have been preaching on learning discipleship from *The First Disciples*.

Both Judas and Thomas play pivotal roles near the end of Jesus' life. How do they compare and contrast? Both make mistakes, and both are chastised by Jesus, but one dies lost and alone while the other is restored to the community of faith and in his relationship with Christ. How can we, in the end, be like the second disciple and not the first one?

- 1. Judas Iscariot is the most notorious and universally scorned of all the disciples. Read Matt. 26:14-16, 20-25, and 47-50, and 27:1-7. What actions did he take? How did Jesus react to his actions? When Judas found out that Jesus was condemned, what did he do?
- 2. There are many theories as to why Judas betrayed Jesus. I mentioned several in my sermon. In your mind, what was the reason or reasons?
- 3. There is a church in Eastern Pennsylvania that has an impressive chapel. There is a life-sized painting of Jesus with the twelve disciples. To facilitate meditation, there are twelve chairs placed in a semi-circle around the painting. The back of each chair is labeled with one of the disciple's names. The chair that gets the heaviest use and suffers the most wear is the Judas chair. Why do you think that is the case? How do you identify with Judas?
- 4. Now let's take a look at Thomas. Read John 20:19-29. Do you know why Thomas was not with the other disciples (verses 19-23) when Jesus appeared the first time? Speculate. Why might he have been absent?
- 5. What does John 20:24-25 say the other disciples did after Jesus had appeared to them? What did they say exactly? What was Thomas' response?
- 6. Verse 26 says that "A week later His disciples were *again* in the house, and *Thomas was with them.*" In Luke 4:16, it says about Jesus, "When He came to Nazareth, where He had been brought up, He went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, *as was His custom.*" Talk about the significance or insignificance of regular worship, fellowship, and community with other disciples. Who might benefit from joining your small group? What is your custom regarding worship and fellowship?
- 7. Thomas makes one of the greatest affirmations of faith in all of Scripture (John 20:28b—*My* Lord and *my* God), right up there with Peter's profession of faith in Matthew 16:16. What, if anything, did Jesus do to convince Thomas that He had been raised from the dead and was worthy of worship?
- 8. Verse 29 seems to be for people who have lived after the original disciples, including us. How do you hear Jesus' challenge? Are you blessed? Do you believe in Jesus as your Savior? And how has this series on discipleship helped you to become closer to Christ and to follow Him as Lord? In other words, how has your discipleship changed, grown, developed, been transformed?
