



Generosity Session II

God Owns Everything

Make a joyful noise to the Lord all the lands! Serve the Lord with gladness! Come into His presence with singing. Know that the Lord is God. It is He that made us, and we are His; we are His people, and the sheep of His pasture. – Psalm 100:1-3

The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and those who dwell therein; for God has founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the rivers. – Psalm 24:1-2

Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God? You are not your own; you were bought with a price. So glorify God in your body! – 1 Corinthians 6:19-20

Not long ago, a man went to McDonald's with his granddaughter for lunch. He was trying to "be good" and stay on his low-cholesterol diet. That's hard to do at McDonald's. The granddaughter ordered her favorite Happy Meal while the grandfather ordered the most low-cholesterol lunch he could find. As the granddaughter began enjoying her lunch, the grandfather looked over and spied her delicious, golden brown French fries. He remembered back to when he had last had a French fry. It seemed like years! When he thought that she wasn't looking, he reached across the table and took two French fries. Before he could put them in his mouth, his granddaughter slapped his hand, knocked the French fries down, and said, "They're mine, Granddad." In that moment, many thoughts swirled through the granddad's mind. First of all, he realized that he had paid for those French fries! Secondly, he realized that he had the money to buy as many French fries as he wanted. Thirdly, he realized that he was strong enough to physically take the French fries away from his granddaughter if that was his desire. In her immaturity, the granddaughter thought that the French fries belonged to her when in reality they were a gracious and generous gift from a loving grandfather who loved her more than she could imagine. Do you see a sermon in here somewhere?

Like the granddaughter, many of us assume that everything we have is ours. We forget that all we have is a gracious gift from a God who loves us more than we can imagine. We also forget that God has the power to take away our gifts and blessings whenever He chooses. God is both sovereign and omnipotent.

One of the brashest assumptions of our humanistic, materialistic society is the assumption that we own everything that we have. We assume that our bodies and possessions belong to us. We say things like, "It's my home, my car, my body, my children, my money, my yard, my future, my job, my spouse, my clothing, my life." The truth is that all of these things are gifts from God. We sometimes forget that God gave us eyesight, hearing, creativity, intelligence, and the ability to work and make money. We forget that these things are not ours...they are simply entrusted to us. How different our lives would be if we came to the realization that God owns everything and we are simply "trustees" of gifts and responsibilities that God has entrusted to our care. Anyone who is retired knows that a job does not belong to us. Anyone who is a parent knows that children are not ours. We simply care for them for a period of time.

In Matthew 25:14-30, Jesus tells the parable of the talents. Read this parable together in your small group and discuss its meaning. It holds a key to

understanding one of the great principles of stewardship: God created us to be trustees of money, gifts, land, people, and the future. How we take care of God's money, God's gifts, God's land, and God's people is the question of stewardship.

Ouestions for Reflection and Discussion:

Edwin Markham tells "The Parable of the Builders" that expresses the truth of Matthew 25:14-30. The story is as follows:

"There was a very rich man who owned great expanses of land. One day, he walked over the hillsides and surveyed all the land that he owned. He saw a lovely, sun-drenched hilltop below the hovel cottage of his carpenter. He went to the carpenter and said, 'I have plans for a lovely home on a sunny hill. I want you to build a house there. I want you to build it good and strong. Employ the best workers, use the best materials, for I want it to be a good house.' Then the rich man went away. The carpenter began to build the house, but as he proceeded, he decided to cut costs and pocket the difference. He built the house with inferior materials and poor workmanship. He thought he had outsmarted the owner. When the rich man returned, the carpenter told him that he had finished the house with the best materials and workmanship he could find. 'Good,' said the owner, 'I'm glad that it is a good house. I have intended all along to give it to you. The house is yours!' The carpenter was shocked. 'Oh!,' he said, 'If only I had known I was building the house for myself.'"

- 1. What can we learn from the parable of the builders about stewardship of time, finances, and gifts?
- 2. What lessons can we learn from the parable of the talents in Matthew 25:14-30? Keep in mind several points as you discuss this question:
 - a. God gives different people different gifts. No two people have exactly the same creativity, intelligence, amount of money, etc. Rather, each person is unique and must use what they have been given.
 - b. The person who is punished in the story is the one who does not use his talent to the glory of God. When we bury our talents or fail to use them, we disappoint God.
 - c. When we do not exercise our gifts or use what we have been given, we lose what we have. This is a universal principle of life. Isn't it true that if one has a great deal of talent and exercises it, he or she is progressively able to do more with it? If, however, an individual has a skill and fails to exercise it, it most likely will diminish in the near future. This is true in all facets of life.
- 3. What difference would it make in the way you live your life if you believed that God owned everything? Would it make a difference, or would you live life exactly as you are living it today?
- 4. What specific differences does it make in your life that you are a trustee of things that belong to God rather than the owner of those things?
- 5. Can you think of a time in your life when you came to the realization that you didn't "own" something?
- 6. What are the characteristics of a faithful trustee?
