
WHEN IS ALPHA?

Christian Diaz has been on the MDPC staff since 2016 as a facility coordinator—but, in his native Peru, he practiced as a dentist. In the early years of his career, Christian regularly went on medical mission trips, traveling the globe, from jungles to mountains, to volunteer his time and expertise. In early 2017, a year since his arrival at MDPC and almost four years since his last medical mission trip, he felt his spirit tugged. God was moving in his heart, strongly enough for Christian to plan his first self-guided mission trip...

hristian, who grew up in Lima, Peru, compares the city to Los Angeles. Like LA, it has its "Beverly Hills," the beautiful coastal city center that all the tourists visited; and it has its barrios and outer wards of poverty. One of the latter, Villa el



Salvador, is known for its extreme poverty, street violence, and drug issues. This is the area Christian chose to target.

Through his old friend Willy, Christian was connected to Pastor Elías Hurtado Junco, who leads a Villa el Salvador church called Pastor Divino. The

church ministers to about 490 children, ages 3 to 17. Three days per week, each of the kids spend the morning or the afternoon at Divino, depending on his or her school schedule. They half of their day being tutored, and are fed lunch.



While helping the children along academically, Pastor Junco and his 22 adult volunteers work hard to also instill strong Christian values. These kids spend every day surrounded by the influence of the street - drugs, gangs, and the promise of

easy money. Pastor Junco has a very specific goal for Divino Church: "To build a new generation of love, obedience, and service." He recognizes that keeping the next generation safe, strong, and Christ-centered requires today's adults to commit to shepherding the children, and he works to equip and encourage his congregation in the effort.

Christian arrived in Peru armed with \$1600.00 in donations from MDPC staff, ministries, and members, plus savings out of his own pocket. He and his team of four – two friends from dental school and Mom and Dad Diaz – visited Lima's downtown market to pick up supplies like toothbrushes and tiny toys (aka, motivation for the kids to sit through a cleaning!).

Once at Divino, the dental mission team set up their week-long operation in the church's chapel. Each day was much the same: The team would first speak to a group of kids about the importance of dental hygiene, proper brushing, and daily tooth care. Then Christian's friend Willy would lead a devotional or Bible lesson, and after that the dental visits would begin. The three dentists had to work quickly to see each of the 100 children that lined up each day! Older kids got cleanings, and everyone got a fluoride treatment to prevent future cavities.





After everyone for the day was seen, the kids were given their promised toys. "You can't give out the prizes before," noted Christian, "or there's chaos." The group would gather to sing hymns and Peruvian songs, and more stories would be shared of Christ's saving grace. The team, staff, and children had lunch together each day, enjoying *aji de gallina* or other regional specialties. Simple food, but wholesome, filling, and frequently the only meal the kids would eat that day.

Christian returned from the trip satisfied with their work, but eager to do more. His concern for the needs of Pastor Divino is evident in all his stories and in the photos he shared: the roof leaks but corrugated plastic is expensive; books and school supplies are unavailable for local children; part of the church's third floor is quite simply *gone* - the roof over that portion was destroyed, and the pillars have become rubble. This first trip was just the beginning, and he will visit again, of that Christian is certain. With God's grace and the generosity of Christian's friends, each time will touch more lives...and more teeth.

Ecclesiastes 3:1-11a Alf Halvorson preaching This is a stand-alone sermon to get our heads around the beginning of another year. 2018 is upon us; can you believe it? In one sense, the new month and year are just a week or so ahead of the previous ones. And in another sense, there is a fresh start, and a chance to begin again with God and others. John Maxwell, a retired pastor who writes a

great deal about leadership, pens that "You will never change your life until you change something you do <u>daily</u>." The secret of success (and faithfulness) is found in our daily routines.

- 1. Read Ecclesiastes 3:1-11a. As you look back on the four quarters of last year, what seasons or appointed times using the language of Ecclesiastes 3 did you go through individually and as a family? What do you think we went through as a church? As a community? As a global community?
- 2. It looks to me, in each pairing, that there is a taking on and a giving up; or to put the dichotomies in other terms, a building up and a tearing down, a positive and a negative, an adding and a subtracting, a creating and a destroying. How can both be of God? Share some examples from your life or from our world.
- 3. There are some difficult seasons: *a time to kill* (vs. 3); *a time to mourn* (vs. 4); *a time to lose* (vs. 6); *a time to keep silence* (vs. 7); *a time to hate and a time for war* (vs. 8). Is this prescriptive—or descriptive? In other words, does God force these on us as God's will, or do humans go through these times because of sin and brokenness?
- 4. Take "a time to hate" for example. Proverbs 6:16 says, "There are six things that the Lord hates, seven that are an abomination to Him: haughty eyes, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, a heart that devises wicked plans, feet that hurry to run to evil, a lying witness who testified falsely, and one who sows discord in a family." Which one or two of these statements must you join God in "hating" this season?
- 5. I talked in my sermon about the Jewish, Greek, and Roman periods of life. Which season would you say you are in right now? If you are having a difficult time with a family member or friend or neighbor, is it possible that they are in a different season and you two are somehow *missing* each other? How might placing yourself in their shoes or season help?
- 6. Verse 11a says, "[God] has made everything suitable [apt, just right, beautiful] for its time." If you are in a difficult season, how might you see its beauty or apt-ness? If you are in a sweet season, how can you enjoy it but also empathize with those who are not in that season?
- 7. Seasons, by definition, change. In certain climates, the changes are radical; in others, the changes are subtle. How can you/we prepare for and even celebrate the changing of the seasons?
