

Those who came before us modeled how to build and maintain a thriving ministry to our church, our community, our city, and around the globe. As a Legacy Giver, you become a key part of the continuing mission of MDPC that's building tomorrow's disciples, starting today.





### What is Legacy Giving?

The purpose of Legacy Giving is: 1) to insure the future of MDPC; *and* 2) to enhance MDPC ministries *now*. A common misconception of Legacy Giving is that it's only made through your will or estate - that you are "planting a tree under which you will never sit." Though estate bequests are an important part of any Legacy program, giving today to initiatives about which you are passionate means you get to see the effects of your gift - and possibly even participate in enacting them!

#### Here are some important points to remember:

- Regular giving goes toward the annual budget, critical in maintaining the church's programs for children, youth, and adults *and* supporting our ministry partners. Legacy gifts support initiatives beyond our normal annual budget.
- Legacy gifts may be given at any time
- There is no minimum amount
- You choose whether your gift is unrestricted or designated for a specific fund.
- There are several funds you may choose to support with your Legacy Gift. To learn more about these individual funds, visit **legacy.mdpc.org**.

#### **GIVING OPTIONS**

#### Here are three examples of legacy giving projects and initiatives:

- One great example of legacy giving is the endowment given for the **Alpha Houston** program and its Hub Director, Dan Aikins. A single private donor underwrote Alpha's costs for a period of three years at a declining annual rate (100%, 60%, and 40%), after which MDPC assumes financial responsibility for the program and associated salaries. Alpha's outreach to the non-churched and even church-averse is an important part of our mission to the lost. The spring 2018 Alpha course already is bearing fruit! Help build upon the foundation that's being laid.
- Legacy gifts will be used in the near future to resurface and reconfigure the
  North Parking Lot and add LED lighting. Dangerous situations have been
  caused by cars speeding through our parking lot to avoid the busy intersection
  at Blalock and Memorial. The project will enhance the safety of our children as
  they enter and exit The Yellow School, and also others as they walk to and from
  their cars. In addition, new and expanded lighting will enhance safety at night
  for our members, staff, and guests.
- One of MDPC's Strategic Goals is to host nationally known speakers each year, events which create opportunities for us to invite in friends and neighbors of many interests and faiths. This project was not budgeted, but discretionary funding last year allowed the five speakers that have visited thus far. Your legacy gift is needed to continue to have high quality speakers and keep this engaging outreach going!

Some of the other projects that need funding include scholarship support for seminary students and mission trips, and deferred facilities maintenance.

acts." In other words, praise is to be intergenerational—passed on from one generation to the next. If it is not passed on, the church is one generation away from extinction. To put it another way: The faith has no grandchildren.

- 1. Read Psalm 145:1-13a. It appears that verses 1-3 are a block; 4-7 are a block; 8-9 a block; and 10-13a a block. What is going on in each block? How would you categorize them?
- 2. Last Sunday was Youth Sunday. We had six Senior Sermons in the three English-speaking services that were personal and meaningful. What, in your mind, are we doing right in passing on the faith to the next generation? Where might we improve?
- 3. How are you part of that transference of knowledge, faith, praise, mentoring, and service?
- 4. I talked in my sermon about the money side of that transfer. MDPC has a tradition of annual giving/pledging and, on occasion, a capital campaign. But it has not really had a vibrant and working endowment/foundation/legacy giving program to fuel initiatives that are above and beyond the annual budget, but not really capital campaigns. In the three prior churches that I served, they had an active legacy giving emphasis. Why do you think MDPC has not had the middle bucket? Could you see positive reasons to have the middle tool to facilitate scholarships, parking lot safety and repair upgrades, or Alpha/evangelism efforts?
- 5. I commented that "one generation can laud God's works to the next" by estate planning and putting the church in their wills. And that people who have no end in sight can give to the Legacy Program and *see* the impact of their efforts as they live for many more years. They can partner now with the next generation in creative and faith-filled ways. Have you pondered putting the church in your will or giving a gift above and beyond your regular annual pledge to inspire and partner with the next generation now?
- 6. If you are in your teens or 20s or 30s, does this conversation make sense to you and apply to you? How or what would be a way you could "laud God's works to another generation"? What might a stewardship of time or talent or treasure look like for you?
- 7. I ended with a story about Al Capone, Easy Eddie, and Butch O'Hare. What were your takeaways from this story and from the sermon as a whole?
