'For Thine is the Kingdom, and the Power, and the Glory, Forever and Ever, Amen'' 1 Chron 29:10-13; Romans 11:33-36 • Alf Halvorson Preaching Sermon Notes written by Rev. Beth Case

The Lord's Prayer

- 1. As we've studied the Lord's Prayer, which petition has stayed with you? Why might that phrase be meaningful to you in this season of life?
- 2. How has this sermon series explained the concept of "kingdom"? Where have you seen examples of God's Kingdom in the here and now (even before *forever and ever*)?
- 3. Most New Testament versions do not include this week's petition in the Lord's Prayer. How did Pastor Alf's sermon help us understand this? From where might this phrase have originated? (For further insight, read the prayer of King David in 1 Chron 29:11-13.)
- 4. The Lord's Prayer opens by rooting us in kinship with our Heavenly Father. The prayer closes by expressing our faith in God's kingship. Agree or disagree: The Lord's Prayer tells us more about God than it does about us.
- 5. The Lord's Prayer names the dailiness of human need, while also hailing the eternal nature of God's power and glory. How do these two themes relate to each other? What can we learn from the Lord's Prayer about God's perspective on the present? the future? the past?

During the Pray Like Jesus series, these notes discuss various models of prayer. Following a brief introduction and discussion of the week's prayer practice are suggestions for exercising that method of prayer. Try these as a small group, on your own, or with your friends or family.

Praying God's Character

Have you ever wondered whether your prayers are in line with God's will? Or have you found yourself reluctant to pray because you are not sure for what to ask?

We can pray confidently when we pray according to God's character. The Lord's Prayer gives us one template for this; first and foremost it recognizes Who God is. When we prayerfully appeal to God's character, we seek both His glory and our good. Prayer then, is not simply self-centered and self-serving. Prayer is God-honoring; we ask God to be true to Who He is, and to reveal more of Himself to us.

Elijah prayed this way: "O Lord, …let it be known this day that You are God in Israel, … Answer me, O Lord, answer me, so that this people may know that You, O Lord, are God…" (1 Kings 18:36-37a). And the prophet Micah uttered a plea based on God's mercy: "Who is a God like You, who pardons sin and forgives the transgression of the remnant of His inheritance? You do not stay angry forever but delight to show mercy. You will again have compassion on us…" (Micah 7:18-19).

Scripture has much to say regarding what God is like, and what God is not like. The Lord's Prayer reminds us that God is King, that He is Powerful, that He is glory, that He is Abba! William Barclay writes: "We end the prayer by thinking of the God in whom there is both the love to listen and the power to act... We end our prayer in the confidence that in his love God has heard, and that in his dynamic power he will answer."

Listed below are some of God's attributes. Feel free to add to the list as you recall words or images used in Scripture to describe God:

Put It Into Practice

(Choose one to practice with your small group, and one to practice on your own.)

- 1. Respond to this quote: "To pray is not only to be truly godly; it is also to be truly human....Men and women are at their noblest and best when they are on their knees before God in prayer." - John Stott
- 2. Weave prayer into everyday occurrences and decisions by walking through the following exercise. Try doing this each evening, or each weekend. As you do this with increasing frequency, you will likely find yourself increasingly aware of God in the nitty-gritty moments of ordinary days:
 - a. Gather the day write down 6-8 memorable events of the day (week) including significant conversations, meetings, meals, prayer times, exercise, work, etc.
 - b. Reflect on the day as you remember each event, what emotions come to mind? (The following questions are often used in the Prayer of Examen*.)
 - For which happening am I grateful?
 - Where did I give and receive the most love today? Where did I give and receive the least love today?
 - What tasks and relationships were life-sapping? life-giving?
 - In what activity did I sense the most/least connection with God?
 - c. Notice God in the day what attributes of God were on display today, expressed through a person, evident in Creation, or displayed in circumstances. Next to each event, write an attribute of God that your noticed.
 - Was there a characteristic of God that you saw in someone else?
 - Was there a characteristic of God that you showed to someone else?
 - What characteristic of God guided or helped you today?
 - d. More of God in the day Which characteristic of God, if more was revealed, would have made a positive difference in the day?
 - Ask God to show this attribute to you and to others. Examples: "Heavenly Father, I am in need of your _____ (strength, mercy, etc...)." "God of all Comfort, please comfort..."
 - Keep a journal of this exercise in order that you might remember your requests, and celebrate God's provisions.
- 3. Look at a list of those for whom you pray (Partners in Prayer, family, friends, mission partners, teammates, colleagues...). What attribute of God might they need in their life? As you pray, appeal to God based on that attribute:
 - "All-Wise God, please give your wisdom to _____."
 - "Jesus, you promise to be Emmanuel, God-with-us. _____ is hurting and alone. Would you affirm your presence to him/her."
- 4. Children can learn to notice God in their daily lives by playing "I spy God." Be intentional about eating together. At the dinner table, invite your kids to tell the family where they "spied God" that day. (Idea courtesy of Adele Calhoun)
- * The practice of daily Examen has been utilized by Christians throughout the ages. Examen questions help us pay attention to God's interior movements amid the external activities of one's day. Examen is useful in deepening one's pray life, and in navigating seasons of discernment.
