All Is Rubbish

Philippians 3:4b-12 | Alf Halvorson preaching

We are well under way in our summer sermon series, *Wrestling With Scripture*, looking at the tough texts of the Old and New Testaments; texts you selected for us to address either in sermons or podcasts. Today, on this July 4th Sunday, when we celebrate our Independence from Great Britain, we look at a section of Scripture where Paul gives his credentials, his resume, his pedigree; he defines "who he is" to perhaps the favorite church, the church at Philippi. And he gives us a couple of principles in dealing with an allegiance other than God.

- 1. Read Philippians 3:4b-6. What gives Paul "confidence in the flesh"? Go through each phrase in these short verses and try to grasp what Paul is saying. For example, Paul's phrase, "circumcised on the eighth day" comes from Genesis 17:12 and is reaffirmed in Leviticus 12:3.
- 2. If you were to summarize what you think Paul is articulating in verses 4b-6 using modern language, what would you say? How would you put it?
- 3. Read verses 7-9. After having set up all the pins of his pedigree in a theological bowling alley, Paul then knocks them down in these two verses. How could he regard them as "loss"? Why does he now see these credentials as "rubbish"? Note: The word *rubbish* in Greek is a very strong and earthy word, virtually meaning feces. Why use that salty of a word at this point?
- 4. Read verses 10-11. What does Paul say he wants? Why does he say he wants it? Have you ever prayed to God that you wanted the same things? Are you willing to experience these negatives to receive those positives?
- 5. In verses 12-14, Paul is not talking about "works righteousness," trying to save ourselves. We have talked in previous Notes about receiving salvation by grace through faith in Christ's life, death, and resurrection (justification). Once made right with God through Christ, we (in gratitude) seek to become more Christ-like in our lives, through the power of the Holy Spirit (sanctification). How does Paul talk about that in his own life? How are you putting those ideas into practice in your own life?
- 6. In the last part of the sermon, I tried to make a connection between Paul's fighting of idolatry and our need to do the same thing. Can love of country be an idol? Can our love of country supersede our love of God? How? On the other hand, can love of country be a good thing? How did I suggest that we could love God and country? Hint: It was a John Knox quote, which says, "The best servants of the state are those whose highest loyalty is not to the state, but to God." How might that work for you/us?
