IN SYNC • LUKE 13:6-9 (NRSV) Senior Pastor alf Halvorson Preaching This is the third sermon and small-group discussion in our *All In* sermon series. We have looked at Community (*Connect or Die*), and we have looked at how Jesus grew intellectually, physically, spiritually, and relationally. What habits, disciplines, and practices do you and I have in place to grow and find deep connectedness? As we said in week one, "It is not our abilities that show us who we are, but our

choices." Today, we look at one of the most ignored parables of Jesus. It is the short story of Jesus in Luke 13:6-9, which seems to put all the things we have been talking about in this series into story form.

- 1. Read Luke 13:6-9. From verses 6-7, what seems to be the problem? What is the owner's recommended solution?
- 2. The tree is barren; and had not produced for three years. Who is Jesus talking about here? Is it the Pharisees and Sadducees who had heard the prophets and Jesus Himself, but were still "holding back" or "actively opposing" Him? Is it Israel? Is it any potential disciple? Discuss.
- 3. If you think a little more broadly and symbolically, how can humans in general and you and I in particular exhibit barrenness? I mentioned some options in my sermon just to get you thinking about others, our church, and your own life.
- 4. Verse 8 is a rich and amazing sentence. What is the gardener's recommended solution? It contains three parts: let it alone for one more year; let me dig around it and get to the root of the problem; and let me put fertilizer on it. What role does the tree play? And what role does the gardener play? And, by the way, who is the gardener?
- 5. I reduced the three parts of the gardener's solution to three words: grace, truth, and time. If that combination is a powerful one toward healing, restoration, and revitalization, do you allow those three things when you are trying to solve a problem at work/home, help someone overcome a personal issue, or deal with something in your own life? Which part are you poor at right now; which part or parts do you do well? Are all three necessary in most cases or can you get by with one or two aspects alone?
- 6. Take some problem in your life or of the group's imagining and identify what grace, truth (digging around and fertilizer), and time might look like.
- 7. In your spiritual life, think about where you are thriving and where you might be languishing—or even barren. Now think through what grace, truth, and time might look like in that situation. Can you do all of the parts "all by yourself"? Consider asking someone from the group or the whole group to help; and what role should God be asked to play? Remember, the tree in the parable seems just to be surrendered. In other words, it allows the gardener to dig around, to get to the root of the problem, and then to apply fertilizer and other interventions where needed. Where are we like and unlike a fig tree? What might all this look like in your life?
