

COMMIT: The Model

Luke 10:25-37 | Pastor Alf preaching

This is the first of a series on Generosity called Passion Into Action: Commit, Connect, Affect – or, as my three messages are titled, The Model, The Motivation, The Method. In this first sermon, we look at the parable of The Good Samaritan in Luke 10:25-37, maybe the best-known parable Jesus ever told. It is my second favorite, after the Parable of the Prodigal Son.

Let me set the stage and context for this amazing parable. According to Luke 9:1-5, Jesus has called the 12 together, given them power through the Holy Spirit, and sent them out to proclaim the Kingdom of God and to heal; and chapter 10 begins with the 70 being sent out in pairs to every town and place where Jesus intended to go with this charge: "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest. Go on your way. See, I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves." The 70 return to share that amazing things have happened, "even the demons submit to us." Then a lawyer stands up to test Jesus...

- 1. Read Luke 10:25-29.
 - a. What question does the lawyer (religious scholar) ask?
 - b. How does Jesus respond? What question does Jesus ask?
 - c. How does the lawyer respond to Jesus' question?
 - d. What is Jesus' response to that answer?
 - e. What is the lawyer's last question? Why does the lawyer ask it, according to the text?
- 2. Jesus' answer to the lawyer's last question (e.) is the parable. Read Luke 10:30-35. What strikes you about this story in the wider context of the Mission of the 12 and 70, and the dialogue with the lawyer?
- 3. Do we know any cultural markings of the person who is hurt?
 - a. What do you know about the two people who do not help the wounded person? Why, do you think, did they walk by the injured man? (Note: In my sermon, I gave a couple of possible reasons.)
 - b. Who helps the injured man? What do you know about Samaritans? How, specifically did he help? And how did he not help? (For example, he did not stop his life. He kept his next day's appointment.)
- 4. In verse 29, the lawyer asked, "And who is my neighbor?" *Neighbor* is a noun here. Read verse 36. Jesus asks the lawyer this question, "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" Or, in Greek, who "neighbored"? *Neighbor* in verse 36 is a verb. Is that significant? How? What might Jesus be trying to say not only to the lawyer but to the wider crowd, including us?
- 5. From reading and studying this passage, what is your definition of "neighbor" now? Who *is your neighbor* (noun), and how are we supposed *to neighbor* (verb)?
- 6. I tied the Samaritan's gift of first aid and money (as well as his pledge to come back and repay whatever more was spent) to our generosity campaign? How might that connection influence your attitude toward pledging for 2019 and even what your pledge might be this year? Jesus does say, "Go and do likewise." (Note: There are so many needs in Houston and beyond, and I know of no church that vets its outreach partners more thoroughly than MDPC, and no church more committed to maximizing the impact of its staff and programs and becoming leaner where needed.)
