

don't always see God's work behind the scenes (or even up front) unless we are carefully attuned to the present, or look back for signs of it in hindsight.

- 1. As you look back on your life, are there instances you see now where God was at work that you didn't see back then? Share examples.
- 2. Read Gen. 45:1-8 and 50:15-21. What strikes you? How does Joseph say God has been at work in his life?
- 3. How has God worked for *good* in and through other people's *bad* intentions or actions?
- 4. I shared a quote American soldiers found at the close of WWII, scribbled on the wall of a basement in a concentration camp: "I believe in the sun, even when it is cloudy; I believe in love, even when I cannot feel it; and I believe in God, even when God seems silent." What do you affirm from that quote? Is there anything that troubles you or with which you disagree regarding its sentiment?
- 5. At the end of my sermon, I told you of an African king and his close friend and their habit of saying, "This is good," about whatever happened to them in life. There came times when they disagreed with the concept; but at other times it seemed to prove true. How did you react to the story? Does it ring true or false to you? If false, how would you tell your version of the story?
- 6. As you look back over Joseph's life and this whole series, what is the takeaway for you at this point in your life? Is there something you need to believe, or repent of, or do? Is there an action of God you need to "be thankful for" or recognize?
- 7. What crossroad that Joseph faced are you (or someone you love) facing? How might Joseph's good or bad example inform or inspire your next steps?
