A Summer Series on the Book of Philippians **Philippians 2:19-30**

It All At first glance, our sermon passage seems awfully bland. We've spent all of chapter 2 on marvelous teaching about Jesus and the application of this teaching in human lives (Philippians 2:1-18), and now we get a travelogue. Paul wants to visit but he can't yet since he's under arrest. Timothy will visit soon. Epaphroditus will visit sooner, returning home to Philippi immediately. Ho hum.

Yet Paul is sneaking in the sort of passage he normally puts at the end of his letters to churches because he has something significant to say about what he previously stated. "You know the great doctrine you just read? Here are two people I'm sending to you as living examples its application. Pay attention!" Why? Because we all need role models, people from whom we can learn by both their words and their deeds.

- 1. Name someone who influenced you significantly when you were young. Describe this person in detail. What about him/her was so meaningful to you?
- 2. What jumps out at you about Timothy as Paul mentions him in verses 19-24? Why?
- 3. Paul's comment about Timothy in verse 20, "I have no one like him," is so much stronger than it comes across in our English translations. In the earliest manuscripts, Paul is saying he and Timothy are "of equal soul." What does such a phrase say about Timothy's connection and importance to Paul?
- 4. A key statement in this passage is found in verse 22: "But Timothy's worth you know, how like a son with a father he has served with me in the work of the gospel." How would the Philippians know Timothy's worth? How has Timothy's worth been proven? What are the advantages of having a colleague whose ability, personality, and steadfastness are known factors? How might these advantages help Paul, Timothy, and the Philippians share the gospel?
- 5. What characteristics of Timothy should we seek to imitate? What are sub-Christian or moralistic motivations for doing so? What are truly Christian motivations instead?
- 6. As you read about Epaphroditus in verses 25-30, what stands out in your mind? What makes it so noticeable?
- 7. What four glowing terms of endearment does Paul use about Epaphroditus in verse 25? What is significant about each one?
- 8. Why would Paul send Epaphroditus back to Philippi now? What had happened to Epaphroditus? Why do both Paul and Epaphroditus want Epaphroditus to return home? (Note particularly Epaphroditus' motivation.)
- 9. How does Paul want the Philippians to receive Epaphroditus? Why? How does this preferred reception tie in with Paul's desire to equip the Philippians for their work?
- 10. The word "risk" in verse 30 has its roots in a gambling term of the first century. We could say that Epaphroditus "took a chance" or "rolled the dice" when he went to Rome to help Paul. Some say that faith-based risk is an essential part of the Christian journey. Do you agree? Why or why not? Name one risk, in the name of faith, you perceive God is leading you to pursue.
