The Foolish Rich Man (Luke 12:13-21 NRSV)

¹³Someone in the crowd said to Him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." ¹⁴ But He said to him, "Friend, who set Me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" 15 And He said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." ¹⁶ Then He told them a parable:

"The land of a rich man produced abundantly. 17 And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' 18 Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. ¹⁹ And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.²⁰ But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' ²¹So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."

The Foolish Rich Man

Luke 12:13-21 NRSV | Alf Halvorson preaching

This is the fourth in our fall series of messages on Jesus' Parables. Last week we looked at prayer; this week we look at how to approach and respond to blessings from our

work and leisure time. There seems to be nothing *off-limits* to Jesus when it comes to our lives. What gives us security? What is permanent and what is transitory?

- 1. Read Luke 12:13-21. What seems to be the circumstance in verse 13 that led to this parable (16-21)? How does Jesus respond to the initial request (vs. 14)? And how does verse 15 prepare the reader or hearer for what is to follow?
- 2. In verse 15, Jesus tries to warn against greed. Would you say that most people today agree or disagree with the statement, "One's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions"? Discuss.
- 3. Focus on the actual parable in verses 16-21. What do you notice about all the pronouns? Does Jesus charge this man with any actual crime of illegal activity? Why does Jesus say that he is a *fool* or *foolish*?
- 4. This man thought that his possessions could cause security and length of life. But then Jesus says, "This very night your life is being demanded of you." Or, tonight you die. Steven Covey has said, "begin with the end in mind." Is that what Jesus is saying here? And how might that help us to put our possessions in proper perspective?
- 5. Jesus seems to be suggesting some things are permanent and some not. We can't take some things with us to heaven; but, if you read verses 21 and 33-34, Jesus seems to suggest that we can take other things. What does He mean by "treasure in heaven"? And how can we be "rich toward God"?
- 6. I told a story at the beginning of my sermon regarding the commercial advertisements connected to the iconic radio skit, "Who's on First?" by Abbott and Costello. What don't you believe now that you used to believe 70 years ago? Are there any beliefs that are permanent? That you can build your life on or that will hold you up if you choose to stand on them? That you trust no matter when they were said? Is there any verse from Luke 12:12-21, 33-34 that you would, could, do, or will put your weight down on today?
