

## TENDING

## John 4:16-26 | Alf Halvorson preaching

Three-part Sermon Series The part Sermon Series The first message, we asked, "What is your Samaria?" I hope you have answered that question; and also made a commitment to be a witness more and more like Jesus was in His encounter with the Samaritan Woman. In this second part of the dialogue, Jesus shares with her the salty side of the Gospel. That is, we can't be forgiven if we don't admit we are sinners. We can't be freed if we don't know we are enslaved. We can't have life unless we embrace the truth. We can't be fully loved if we are not fully known. And to be fully known by God and still loved might just be the greatest gift that God offers to us.

- 1. <u>Read John 4:16-26</u>. Focus on verses 16-19. What is the first request that Jesus makes here? How does the woman answer Jesus? Is she honest? Is it the whole truth? How does Jesus reply to her answer? And what is the name she gives Jesus in verse 19? What is the possible significance of that title?
- 2. Why the woman says what she says in verse 20 is debated by scholars. Some think she is asking Jesus one of the most significant questions she and her people have. *Where is the right place to worship?* That she is going deeper with Jesus into what really matters to her. (The word "worship" or "worshipper" is used 10 times in this short section.) Others believe she is trying to evade the spotlight that has been shown on her in verses 16-18 by starting an argument. Which do you think it is? And why? Could it be both?
- 3. If and when you talk about the faith to someone who has problems with Christianity or the person of Christ, what are the usual arguments they make? How have you approached responding to them in the past? How does Jesus respond in verses 21-24? From last week's sermon and this week's message, will your tactics change? How and why?
- 4. If everyone worships "something," including atheists, that means everyone has a "god" or gods. Isn't the topic of worship a great one to help people wrestle with their lives, their thoughts, and their beliefs?
- 5. Jesus' response to the woman in verses 21-24 somehow leads her to think of and hope for the coming of the Messiah. She says, "When He comes, He will proclaim all things to us." He will offer the definitive answers to this question about worship and all questions. What is Jesus' response? This is the first "I Am" of many in the Gospel of John. What does it mean to you that this woman is the first to hear it? Not Nicodemus, not the disciples, but this woman. How do Jesus' words compare to the words in Ex. 3:13-15? What is Jesus' claim here? If Jesus is really the Messiah, what does that mean for this woman and for you and me? We will find out the conclusion of the story next week, but Jesus' claim to be God the Savior demands a response, doesn't it? What are people's responses to that claim, including yours?
